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Supporting health sector staff and potential recruits in their learning

The learning process and learning styles

Understanding the learning process and how different people learn is an important part of supporting learning and development. A better understanding can enhance your information, advice and guidance (IAG) role and help to inform the decisions about what courses people might choose. People learn in different ways and that can be vital to their success and growing confidence. Questions you might ask include:

- What are the different learning styles?
- What is the difference between formal and informal learning?
- Can certain approaches help people overcome barriers to learning?
- How can an individual develop a learning strategy based on their learning style?
- How do learning styles impact e-learning?

- **Search** Use one of the searchable databases to look for a specific course by topic, job role or an individual's skills and interests. Others will let you search by geographical area or mode of study
- Get advice If you're not sure what course or qualification is required then one
 of the telephone helplines, such as the <u>Health Learning and Skills Advice</u>
 <u>Line</u>, may be a good place to start.
- Quality check Once a course or learning provider is found, you may want to

Study skills/returning to learning

IAG plays a key role in engaging and inspiring staff learning and development. It also ensures that learning and development resources are spent effectively.

You may find that people choose to build on their study skills in a traditional college, training centre or university; others may prefer to take first steps in a local adult education or community centre or even their local library. Some may prefer to learn on line.

Supporting individuals who may have been out of learning or education for some time will be key to ensuring success. For example, a member of staff who has achieved a QCF/SCQF who wants to undertake a foundation degree or an HNC and may need specialist support. Or it might mean encouraging those with negative past experiences of learning to take their first step into a work related qualification. In this case, specialist 'return to learning' courses are an ideal introduction. See the Access to Higher Education section in 'Qualifications and Skills', where study skills are integrated as a core part of learning.

Sources of information and support for staff who are returning to learning include unions, Workers Educational Association (WEA), Open University and the various careers services throughout the UK. Follow the links below to find out more about the available services.

Supporting postgraduate and post registration education

Postgraduate and post registration education cover learning and development for a large number of staff within the health sector. Many registered practitioners are required to undertake post registration education.

How do people access postgraduate/post registration education?

Postgraduate learning can include learning that happens in many different settings, both formal and informal. NHS Careers provides contact links for the main areas of work in the NHS. These include links to professional bodies which have key information around continuing professional development options and post-registration education.

Formal learning often takes place in higher education. Regular personal development reviews with staff will ensure their learning and development needs can be met and planned as part of this process. Read the KSK and PDR information leaflet to find out more.

Registered practitioners and other staff, particularly those who trained some years ago, may not be familiar with higher education, academic routes or career pathways. The IAG process plays an important part in ensuring they remain competent and make the most of their skills and expertise.

Individuals may need support to identify suitable qualifications and awards, and to receive formal recognition for existing skills and knowledge. To find out more, see the <u>accreditation of prior experience and learning</u> section in the information leaflet 'Routes into Health'.

Continuing professional development (CPD) is an important part of postgraduate/post registration education, and helps people to update existing skills. Registered practitioners must do this to maintain their competence and professional registration. You can explore the Department of Health website for information about post-registration education including continuing professional development arrangements.

Top tips for staff interested in leadership roles and development

Staff may want to pursue a management role or explore options for development of their clinical role into leadership or management through various avenues. These are a few examples, though not an exhaustive list:

Mentoring There are a growing number of leadership programmes linked to management/improvement. These include national and regional networks, for example, 'The Improvement Network' in the <u>East Midlands</u> and the <u>NHS North West Leadership Academy</u>.

NHS Leadership Qualities Framework describes the qualities expected of existing and aspiring leaders. The <u>framework</u> is being used in England, Wales and Northern Ireland to underpin leadership development. In Scotland there is a <u>Leadership</u> <u>Development Framework</u>.

Universities can enable individuals to develop their leadership and management skills alongside other advanced clinical practice skills. Many universities offer leadership and management modules and courses specific to the health sector that may be accessed as stand-alone units, or as part of a degree.
