College in Northern Ireland gains Skills for Health Quality Mark

North West Regional College in Northern Ireland has become one of the first organisations to attain the Skills for Health Quality Mark, which is delivered through the National Skills Academy for Health.

The college offers further and higher education to approximately 22,000 students; its School of Health and Social Care trains about 3,000 students each year.

The challenge

The college wanted to gain the Skills for Health Quality Mark for its Level 2 and 3 programmes – Apprenticeship in Health and Social Care and Diploma in Health and Social Care. Both programmes have a focus on work-based learning and the college maintains close relationships with local employers in order to understand their needs and deliver the training that their businesses require from their workforce.

How they did it

The requirements for gaining the Skills for Health Quality Mark are rigorous and thorough. The assessment process focuses on current best practice, and includes on-site visits, interviews with trainers, students and employers, teaching observations and evaluation of documentary evidence.

Skills for Health's assessors worked closely with the Health and Social Care team, supporting them through the assessment process and aiming to make the experience as positive as possible for the college.

The college worked with local employers to help them understand what the Quality Mark was and to ensure that they matched their training to employers' needs.

The outcomes

- The college achieved the Skills
 for Health Quality Mark for both
 programmes, in recognition of the
 high quality of training and education
 they provide and their efforts in
 working to provide training that is
 matched to employer needs.
- The college believes the Quality
 Mark benefits the health sector
 by providing a better more highly
 skilled workforce which is valued
 by employers.



 It also recognises the Quality Mark as a positive step forward for education and training in the health sector, by helping to professionalise the role of Carers and Health Care Support Workers and ultimately to improve the quality of care for patients.
