How did you get your apprenticeship?

I was a Healthcare Assistant on a Trauma and Orthopaedic Surgical ward for 5 years and wanted to become a nurse. I had a level 3 NVQ in Health and Social Care but could not afford to study, bring up children and pay my mortgage. I heard about the Nursing Associate course through my deputy sister, and while waiting for the job to reopen for the next cohort I did a bridging programme suggested for my learning and development. I was notified of a position being open by a trust manager and applied via the NHS jobs.







Who is your training the study model like?

The training is provided by Brighton University in conjunction with my Trust. I work 30 hours per week learning on my base ward and attend University 1 day per week for 7.5 hours. The study model is geared up towards the proficiencies needed to meet the NMC requirements, apprenticeship requirements and my Trust's requirements to become a registered Nursing Associate.
