



Context and Background

Minor illness, sometimes referred to as acute on day presentations, often described as self-limiting or short-term health conditions that typically do not require specialist intervention.

This accounts for a significant proportion of primary care presentations. Conditions such as coughs, colds, sore throats, ear infections, mild gastrointestinal issues, and skin complaints are among the most common reasons people seek primary care support.

An estimated **20–40% of GP consultations** are related to minor illness. Many of these conditions are self-limiting and could be safely managed at home with appropriate self-care advice. However, minor illness still contributes to unnecessary demand on general practice and emergency departments, with **millions of potentially avoidable appointments** each year. The **Self Care Forum** and other national organisations advocate for improved self-care education to empower patients and reduce avoidable primary care visits. With the expansion of self-care initiatives and services such as **Pharmacy First and 111**, many patients now seek initial support outside of general practice.

As a result, when patients do present to general practice, their symptoms may be more complex, prolonged, or unresolved. This requires nurses to have a thorough understanding of **acute** presentations, differentiating between self-limiting conditions and those requiring further intervention.

Equipping primary care nurses with the skills and knowledge to **assess**, **diagnose**, **and treat** acute on day presentations within their scope of practice will enhance patient outcomes and reduce pressure on the wider healthcare system.

In this addendum we endeavour to describe the skills and knowledge nurses working in and across primary care should have to play their role in delivering safe, consistent, and evidence-based care for acute conditions.





Collaboration

NHSE in partnership with South Yorkshire ICB, University of Sheffield, Sheffield Hallam University and Kings College London have been working collaboratively to develop a comprehensive educational resource for General Practice and Primary Care Nurses. The published primary care and core career and capability framework provides a useful insight into what characteristics are required to work at each level of practice with examples of the knowledge and skills required to be working at each level.

The six levels of sphere of clinical practice are:

- Support Work Level Practice Nursing Associate Level/Assistant Practitioner Level
- Registered Nurse Level Practice
- Registered Nurse: Enhanced Level Practice
- Registered Nurse: Advanced Level Practice
- Registered Nurse: Consultant Level Practice

The Educational resources have been mapped by an expert generalist and specialist group of nurses according to scope of practice.

The framework articulates core capabilities necessary for safe and effective care. The capabilities (i.e., skills, knowledge, and behaviours) described in the framework are defined at 3 tiers.

Each tier articulates the minimum and core capability to be expected as opposed to the maximum:

- **Tier 1:** Capabilities that require a general understanding and that support provision of primary care/general practice nursing.
- **Tier 2:** Capabilities that enable the provision of care more independently and a degree of critical analysis.
- **Tier 3:** Capabilities that require an ability to provide care autonomously and independently, an ability to lead practice, operating at the cutting edge of innovation.
